- Copa and Cogeca each have a Praesidium, Presidency and a President:







Cereals: 70% world food & feed!




But EU already use 35 millions Ha of arable land out side EU to feed its consumers




EU Agriculture

- Agricultural outputs represent 326 billion euros in 2009, 30 millions of farmers + 15 million people working for the farming sector;
- in which Crop sector represent 175 billion euros; value stable compare to 2001 (cereals production = 1/4)
- EU Farm income still 50% lower than the EU average;
- Cost Price squeeze is the becoming the first problem;

GM and EU Agriculture

In livestock sector:


- •EU imports 80% of vegetable protein for its livestock sector
- •85% of the imports contain GM material

In crops sector:

- •Few experiences in EU (except Spain and Romania, less than 100 000 ha);
- farm income higher by 15% (example in Spain);
- Productivity is higher in US than in EU using GM
- Increase the reluctance of seed breeding companies to invest in the EU also in conventional breeding


